Limited Enrollment Program Admission Requirements: Since Criminology and Criminal Justice has been designated as a Limited Enrollment Program (LEP), the major requires higher standards than the satisfactory progress benchmarks required in non-LEP majors. Students must meet certain minimum criteria in order to remain in the major or gain access to the major.

LEP Enrollment Policies:

- Only one gateway/entrance course may be repeated and may only be repeated once.
- When more than one course can satisfy a gateway requirement, taking a second course from the list will count as a repeat.
- A grade of a W (Withdrawn) in a course is counted as an attempt.
- Students may apply only once to an LEP. Students who choose to leave the major or are directly admitted and fail to meet the review criteria will be dismissed from the major and may not reapply.
- Students in the major must maintain a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.00. Failure to do so will result in dismissal from the major.

First semester freshmen entering the University as an CCJS major: Students must complete the following requirements **within 45 credits** (not including AP/IB credits) to remain in the major. (*AP/IB OK for requirements*)

- MATH107⁺ or STAT100⁺ with C- or higher. MATH120^{**}, 130, 140 with a grade of C- or higher may be substituted.
- CCJS100 with C- or higher
- CCJS105 with C- or higher

*Formerly MATH111 **Formerly MATH220 ⁺STAT100 preferred

Students who wish to be CCJS after their first semester:

Students may submit an application to declare the CCJS major after completing the LEP admission requirements listed below. (*AP/IB OK for requirements*)

- MATH107^{*} or STAT100⁺ with C- or higher. MATH120^{**}, 130, 140 with a grade of C- or higher may be substituted.
- CCJS 100 with C- or higher
- CCJS 105 with C- or higher
- Minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5 in all previous college-level coursework
